For a couple of days this month, HBS members had the opportunity to volunteer at Sharons' Plants, the nursery owned and operated for forty years by Sharon Petersen in the back of Waimanalo Valley, under the Koolau mountains.

Although her nursery features a range of fruit trees, shrubs, palms, bamboo, ground covers, and tropical plants, we of course know Sharon for her contributions to bromeliad cultivation and to HBS. She currently has seven greenhouses primarily devoted to bromeliads—principally *Neoregelia* and *Tillandsia*, but some *Vriesea* and rarer varieties as well.

To thank Sharon for the *Tillandsia* she provided for our Holiday brunch at the Willows Restaurant, and for the *Neoregelia* she furnished for the Bromeliad Garden at Lyon Arboretum, we took the opportunity to help her clean up and prepare the greenhouses for the biannual State Department of Agriculture inspection. And of course to have some fun, and learn more about bromeliads (and receive a free plant).
