## **Bromeliads in the Media**

The lead photo accompanying Margaret Roach's In the Garden column in the September 13 *New York Times*, "With Summer Nearly Over, It's Time to Think About Houseplants," is a cryptanthus. The species is unidentified, though the photo looks like a bivittatus hybrid. She quotes Marc Hachadourian, director of glasshouse horticulture at the New York Botanical Garden, as recommending "an odd little bromeliad I got at the Two Guys discount store for \$1.99"—because of the way its colors develop in bright indoor light, and because "unlike other bromeliads," cryptanthus "don't store water in their cup of leaves." Pretty accurate, for the *Times*!

Meanwhile, in Hollywood, the Amazon Prime TV series *Homecoming* features a government plot to develop a new drug that causes people to lose their memories, a drug made from the fruit of a mysterious, unidentified plant—except when they finally reveal the plot where the fruit is harvested, it is clearly a field of mixed bromeliads.
