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TILLANDSIA TIPS AND TRICKS—A HANDS-ON WORKSHOP

Tillandsia: we know 'em, we grow 'em, we love 'em. But how much do we really know about this most prolific of Bromeliad genuses?

Did you know that there are well over 600 recognized species of Tillandsia, and probably at least that many more varieties and cultivars? That among bromeliads this genus grows over the widest geographical and environmental range, and varies the most in size? That besides "air plants," Tillandsia are called epiphytes (from Greek words that can mean to grow on something) because they don't need soil, but can grow on other plants without harming them?

Our March program will focus on *Tillandsia*, and will feature our own Lynette Wageman, fresh from a sold-out engagement at the Windward Orchid Show (well, her lecture on bromeliad cultivation was actually free—but to a full house!). Lynette will talk about *Tillandsia*, their basic characteristics, and cultivation techniques. But this program promises to be far more than just a talk. We're also going to have a hands-on plant workshop.

We're asking everyone to please bring a Tillandsia or something that might make a good base for mounting a Tillandsia—a piece of driftwood, a rock, a shell, a cup, and old Spam can. If you have extra to share, please bring them too. Mounting, decoration, and display tools and materials will be on hand, and we'll each have a chance to create our own Tillandsia display, and to take it home. Some of us have been working with these plants expertly for years—as shown by the sample display from Nancie's table at the Windward Orchid Show (above right)—so this meeting will provide an opportunity to learn from one another and to share our experiences and techniques.

CONVENED: 12:45 ADJOURNED: 1:30, for tour.

Terese explained that we would first have a short business meeting and auction, followed by a tour of Lyon Arboretum led by the Arboretum's Educational Specialist and Volunteer Coordinator Jill Laughlin. Terese also noted that, thanks to Lynette's persuasiveness, the Arboretum reduced it's usual \$10 per person fee for docent-led tours to \$5. The Society moved that

MEMBERSHIP: An updated membership directory was circulated. Efforts will be made to contact some of our absent members to see how they are doing and if they wish to renew their memberships. HBS TREASURER'S REPORT: Dolores reported that the current balance is \$9,828.38. She circulated a draft 2015 budget, broken down by month.

BSI MEMBERSHIP: The Society moved

to pay the Bromeliad Society International \$600 to cover affiliate membership for 2015, 2016, and 2017; in addition to dues, the contribution will be specified to support the BSI journal, and conservation, education, and research programs.

PROGRAMS: John reported that for March he will try to put together a program with a professional photographer providing tips on photographing plants.

OLD BUSINESS: Terese reminded members about the upcoming Windward Orchid Society Spring Show, in which

AUCTION: Thanks to Larry for serving as auctioneer, and to Ed for providing some beautiful plants for auction, including an *Aechmea* 'Snowflakes' and a Lisa Vinzant hybrid, a *Neoregelia* 'Blueberry Tiger.'
